Initiated in 1994 through a generous gift of the Buckman family, the Mertie W. Buckman International Internship Program provides the opportunity for outstanding International Studies majors to broaden global understanding through living and working abroad during the summer months. Mertie Buckman students complete an eight-week internship in the country of their choice. Selected students earn one hour of I.S. 470 and F11 credit.

Qualified applicants are rising junior or senior International Studies majors (including International Studies interdisciplinary majors) with a minimum overall/major GPA of 3.3 and relevant foreign language skills. The program is coordinated by the Chair of the Department of International Studies, the Director of Career Services, and faculty members from the Department of International Studies.

Rhodes International Studies students have travelled to all areas of the world with the Mertie W. Buckman International Internship Program. Recent destinations have included Argentina, Czech Republic, England, Germany, Ireland, Morocco, Nepal, and Spain. These students have worked with a variety of employers from businesses to local human rights organizations. I taught English, Mathematics, and Occupational Sciences to young monks aged six to twenty in grades kindergarten, one, two, three, and eight. It was a very immersive experience, exposing me to various intimate facets of Tibetan Buddhist philosophy

This summer I had the unique opportunity to work for an NGO named Poder Ciudadano, the Argentine chapter of a larger NGO, Transparency International. My role within Poder Ciudadano was to educate myself so I could help others regarding "géneros y corrupción", or corruption and topics surrounding genders, in Argentina. My largest independent project was working with other chapters of Transparency International in Latin American countries to organize and host a series of webinars called "Género, Diversidad y Corrupción: La Pandemia Invisible" which educated viewers on the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on gender minorities and

gender-based violence, diversity, and corruption. I also had the opportunity to participate in other projects such as collaborating with the other interns to find examples of precedent in policy and advocacy that other countries around the world have put in place regarding "géneros y corrupción", as well as advocating for transparency from the candidates in Argentina's next election cycle regarding their platforms, specifically through a gendered lens.

Living and working in Buenos Aires, Argentina made this internship opportunity even more tangible and empowering. My internship was in a hybrid format - half of the time I was in the office, and the other half I worked remotely - and when I was not in the office, I had the chance to visit other parts of Argentina while still working. The ability to travel around the country helped to give me a more wholistic view of the work we were doing by showing and reminding me that we are advocating for all Argentinians, not just those in the City of Buenos Aires where I was spending most of my time. Argentina is a beautiful, complex, and very personal country. I feel that I grew immensely from this opportunity and will cherish the experience I had forever.
