Rhodes has received two national accolades that I want to share with you. We were recently named among the nation's <u>leading institutions for study abroad</u>, according to the Open Doors 2023 Report on International Educational Exchange. Rhodes ranked highly for its number of graduates participating in study abroad programs, for the number of students participating in short-term programs, and for participating baccalaureate colleges. These rankings are based on participation during the 2021-22 academic year.

Additionally, the magazine Diverse: Issues in Higher Education and ACPA-College Student Educators International named Rhodes one of the "Most Promising Places to Work in Student Affairs." Only 22 institutions (not numerically ranked) made this.list so we are very proud of that accomplishment and very grateful for our outstanding student affairs team.
