


Application for Admission Special Student



General Information

Special Student Status

Applicants who give evidence of sufficient ability may be admitted as a Special Student to a course of study not leading to a degree, but allowing them to pursue that work for which they are best prepared and which they particularly need. Special Students may enroll in no more than two classes, or for more than eight hours of credit per semester. Special Students who wish to audit classes are limited to taking one course per semester.

Special Students are not regarded as candidates for a degree and are not eligible for intercollegiate athletics, fraternity or sorority membership or other extracurricular activities. In addition, Special Students are not eligible for any Rhodes or federal financial aid funds. Should the Special Student subsequently become a degree candidate, credits earned while a Special Student are applicable towards the degree sought.

Interested students must submit an Application for Admission as a Special Student, a \$45.00 application fee and an official transcript from the last college attended **two weeks prior to the beginning of a new semester.** Applicants who have not been enrolled in any institution of higher education are required to have an official copy of their high school record sent to the Office of Admissions.

Employees of Rhodes who wish to receive tuition remission must contact Human Resources for approval of eligibility for the tuition remission benefit prior to applying as a Special Student.

Special Student admission material is submitted only once. Students who wish to attend Rhodes as a Special Student for a subsequent semester should report directly to the Rhodes Express in Burrow Hall during the first day of the semester as long as they have not taken course work at another institution since their last course work at Rhodes. Special Students who have taken two or more courses at another institution since last attending Rhodes must re-apply for Special Student Status through the Office of Admissions.

The Honor System

Since the College's earliest years, its students have believed in living and working in a place where their integrity is respected and their word is accepted as completely valid. For this reason, the students of Rhodes College have established and maintained an Honor System.

The ultimate responsibility for the system's effectiveness rests on each individual student's promise to abide by the Honor Code and report any known infractions to the Honor Council. This judiciary body is composed entirely of students who are elected by the student body as representatives of each class. After investigating any reported violation of the system, the Honor Council conducts a trial and imposes a just penalty if the accused is found guilty. Although every offense warrants expulsion, extenuating circumstances may justify a penalty of suspension or probation.

Each student who enters Rhodes shall sign the following statement, affirming his or her understanding and acceptance of the Honor System:

"As a student of Rhodes College, I hereby pledge the following:

- I understand the Honor System and am aware of its implications and my responsibility to the System.
- I will not cheat, steal or lie in official matters.
- I will make known to the Honor Council any cases of dishonesty I observe or become aware of at Rhodes.
- I give my full support to both the spirit and letter of the System."

Standards of Community Life

Just as the responsibility for maintaining the code of honor at Rhodes rests with students, so does the responsibility for upholding the standards of conduct expected of all members of the campus community.


The Social Regulations Council (SRC), made up of students elected by each class, is the judicial body charged with seeing that the standards of quality life at Rhodes are maintained. The SRC investigates reported violations of community standards and may impose penalties ranging from various forms of disciplinary action to expulsion from the College.

Each student who enters Rhodes shall sign the following statement affirming his or her understanding and acceptance of the following standards:

"We pledge to treat the members of the Rhodes Community, that is, anyone who lives, works, or learns here, as well as those who visit the community, with conscientious respect, honor, kindness and even-handedness.

We pledge to respect the property of other members of the Community, treating all such property with care equal to or greater than that accorded to our own property. Further, realizing that the property of Rhodes College, that is, its buildings and grounds and all encompassed within, serves to benefit all members of the community, we pledge to preserve this property for others to use after us. Understanding that adherence to these standards is necessary to promote community spirit, we pledge to report violations.

Remembering that the reason the Rhodes Community exists is to promote the intellectual development of its members, we pledge to help create an environment that encourages reasoned discourse and action in a way that promotes this intellectual pursuit for everyone."


